





hen it came to this home on Lake Keowee in South Carolina, interior designer Barbara Westbrook, along with her project manager Kim Winkler, opted to reflect the mountain lake surroundings through a palette that amplifies the light. Barbara Westbrook: Gracious Rooms showcases this home and many others that reflect her expert work of tailoring smart and welcoming spaces.

## The Light Side

When Barbara thinks of this home, she says, "The thing that makes it unusual for a lake house in the mountains is its light palette." Rather than the dark wood, greens and reds of many lake/mountain homes, this home incorporates white and light blue. The downstairs media room is an exception, but the majority of the interior's palette allows the light to saturate and enliven the home and those within it. "Whether we realize it or not, we each have a built-in light meter that, more than any particular style, steers the look and comfort level of our interiors," Barbara writes in Gracious Rooms. The clients at this Lake Keowee residence prefer lots of natural light.





## Refined Rustie

"For the rooms that flow into each other—foyer, living room, dining room, kitchen—I chose a creamy white for the walls, capped by a warm beige for the ceilings. During the day, these rooms are bowls of sunshine; at night, they glow like a lantern," Barbara writes.

Another unique twist Barbara gave to this lakeside home is a sophisticated combination of easygoing rustic and polished elegance. "Even though there are some rustic pieces, it also has a little bit of a dressier vibe," Barbara says. For instance, there are no characteristic rustic beams. Instead, touches like the slipcovered chairs with pleated skirts reflect this sophisticated instinct.

Part of this elegance comes from unique pieces.

Many of these include European antiques such as
the French bakery sign, trestle table and chairs in
the breakfast/dining room. "Americans swoon over
a European accent—and not just the kind you hear.
I'm no exception. Introducing European antiques and
materials into a room can make it more beguiling,"
she writes.

## The Right Texture

Barbara also reminds readers that it's not just color palette that creates a space's ambience, "Materials have everything to do with setting a tone," she writes. The antique American hooked rugs, for instance, are an artful, luxurious and distinct touch. "I really like the pattern and color. They're like little pieces of art, but they're not terribly chunky. To me, there's refinement to the hooked rugs that gives that little bit of dressiness."

"A lot of the window treatments have a beautiful hint of a pattern," Barbara says. In the living room and master bedroom, the window treatments are Chelsea Editions with predominantly light colors so as to delicately frame and soften the light pouring in rather than obstruct it. The delicate patterns, Barbara says, "where it's just a little leaf, feels lighter than if it was a heavy, large pattern and gives it a lighter touch."

Another unique feature of this home is how Barbara and Kim treated the guest bedrooms. Both are tucked under the eaves and are mirror images of each other in terms of their layout, helping the upstairs rooms flow together nicely. To give each

room distinction, they used different colors, green in one and red in the other, and unique pieces in each, such as the painted antique candlestick lamps and three antique mirrors hanging by ribbon above the headboard.

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Perhaps the most delicately sophisticated room is the master bedroom.

The light palette and simple patterns keep it feeling at home in its country environment, while elegant designs and subtle touches—such as a painted white finish on the bench at the foot of the bed and delicate work on the window treatments and duvet cover—add refinement. Then "the bed itself is very refined," Barbara writes. "It's a one-of-a-kind iron bed made by a craftsman here in Atlanta, and you can see the pretty curl on the top of the headboard where we've tied on the headboard there. [...] The light fixtures that are mounted on either side of the bed are delicate in nature." she adds.

"The role of all material in this house, soft and otherwise, is the same: to convey a quiet sense of luxury," Barbara writes. Even the powder room reflects this delicate take on rustic style. The wallcovering features fern leaves pressed under what resembles rice paper, while the mirror and sconces have detailed carvings for that extra bit of texture and interest. With inviting lightness and subtle but pervasive elegance-in every room, this home is a gorgeous and gracious getaway.
